1. Speedy and Public Trial
2. Trial by Jury in a local court
3. Habeas Corpus required
4. Confront witnesses
5. Lawyer provided for the poor.

Common Law (Civil) Court Procedures:

1. Trial by jury if case is > \$20
2. Rules of Common law will Be followed

No cruel or unusual punishment Is allowed

Citizens can't be forced To house (quarter) Soldiers in peacetime

There are rights of the people Not listed in the Constitution (unremunerated rights)

Warrant is needed for search And seizure, and probable Cause is required

- The States get all powers**
1. not given to The National government
 2. Nor prohibited in the Const.

- Criminal Court Cases:**
1. A grand jury must indict
 2. No self incrimination
 3. No double jeopardy

The citizens of each state
(previously they were
Elected by the state legislatures)

Slavery Abolished

Alcohol Prohibited

1. If born in or naturalized by the US,
You are a citizen
2. States must comply with Bill of Rights
3. Due Process required by States
4. All citizens must get equal protection
By the law

Women get to vote

All races can vote

1. Presidential Term begins Jan. 20th
2. Congress begins Jan 3rd every year

Congressional raises don't go into
Effect until the next congressional
Term.

President can serve a maximum of
1. Two elected terms, or
2. A total of 10 years
(i.e. a person who is Vice President
And replaces the President with more
Than two years left in the term cannot
Run twice for President himself)

Washington D.C. residents can vote for
President, and D.C. gets the
Number of electors equal to the
Number of House members they
Would have, if they had any.

No poll tax is allowed

Procedure for removal of
The President if he is severely
